Visit with the Family of John Gooderham

Recently, Rick and I visited the family of the late John Gooderham, our celebrated Canadian paperweight artist, at their home in Orillia, Ontario. John had a long-service record with Algoma Steel in Sault-Ste-Marie, and along the way developed his interest in working with glass.

Many stories were shared amongst his two surviving daughters, Janice and Charlene, and his granddaughter, Kay. In the early days, John visited frequently with Ronald Hansen in Mackinaw, Michigan. He begged Ronald to show him how to make paperweights. Ron would show him absolutely nothing until he mastered the art of making spun glass animal figurines. John practised in the basement of their family home and would challenge his young daughters to guess (if they could) what kind of animal he had just made. In the beginning, many were unrecognizable.

This glass swizzle stick was among the first of John's successes. After this was completed, Ronald Hansen was satisfied and began to share some information with him.



John wanted to be known as 'the one and only' at making something. He decided on making miniatures, particularly dollhouse paperweights and jewellery items. In addition, he was celebrated for his glass buttons which are still popular today with button collectors. Here is a selection of buttons in his daughter's collection.



John traded with other artists at Wheaton Village and at paperweight conventions. His family supported his endeavours over the years. His granddaughter, Kay, recalled spending many hours working with her grandfather doing setups.

On a trip to Murano, his daughter recalled that he was wearing one of his lapel pins when he showed up at one of the glass workshops. He was asked at the door, "Who made that?" When he replied that he had made it himself, he was immediately denied entry.

John was a founding member of PCA Ontario Canada in 1979. His miniature trillium remains as the logo for the Newsletter of our club. He passed away peacefully at home in 2007 at the age of 76.

Definitions

Stave Basket: A row of staves, close to the glass surface, on the lower part of a paperweight forming a basket-like enclosure for a closepack or close concentric millefiori design.

Cullet: (a) Broken or refuse glass, gathered for remelting. From the Latin word *collum*, which refers to the neck of the glass left on the pipe after blowing. Added to a new batch, this melts first, speeding up the fusion of the other ingredients. (b) Also slang for unwanted impurities in a paperweight's encasing glass.
